
Gadgets, Tips, and Tricks & Update from FIRST LEGO League

- If you see a swarm of bees in a location that seems a little odd -- on the ground, or low in a tree or pile of tires, for example -- contact Don Hopkins. We're trying to keep Africanized bees out of NC as long as we can.
- * If you need to buy bees, use the <u>list</u> of approved dealers on the NCDA website.



This Month in the Apiary

• Swarming is already happening in some apiaries. "Bees want to swarm." As Ms. Ruppert says, you can't really completely prevent swarms, but you can take steps to try to head them off. Steps include splitting, removing queen cells, and checkerboarding. Get those bait hives ready!



- If bees have moved up into the hive, consider adding a super, or reversing the order of the boxes in the hive. The queen needs room to lay. Be careful not to split up brood clusters, though.
- If you need to treat for pests, do so before the nectar flow so the treatment won't affect the honey.
- Is the queen laying as she should be? Check out the brood pattern.
- Do you have enough built-out comb in those empty honey supers? That's a good job for the bees this time of year.

• Add at least one honey super by end of month, as nectar flow should be starting in April.
