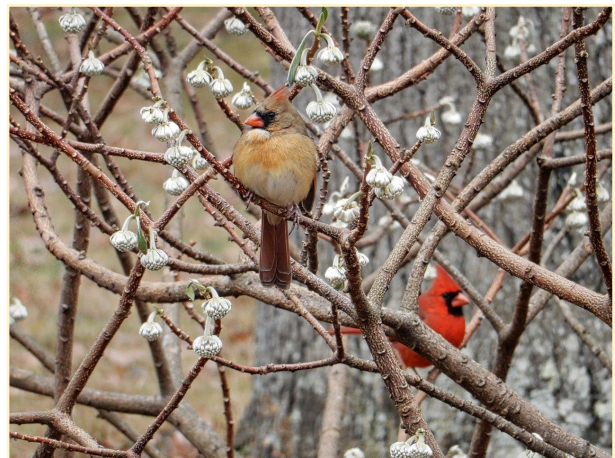
## This Month in the Bee Yard

Thanks to Nancy Ruppert

- Nectar flow is often heaviest this month. Make sure that all medications are out of hive unless required for bees' survival. Be prepared to add new supers every 7-10 days, and remove feeders from all except new or weak hives.
- Bees should be very busy; closely examine hives that are not, and trim weeds that may be hindering flight.
- Swarming usually heavy---continue prevention/capture measures.
- Look closely at brood pattern; replace queen if needed.
- Have everything ready to install nucs/packages that you've ordered; feed upon installation.
- Consider adding queen excluder to prevent brood in honey supers.

#### Paperbush

At the March meeting, Lewis Cauble mentioned that his favorite plant is paperbush. Paperbush is native to the Himalayas and China. It is a deciduous plant, the buds of which begin to form in late summer. They "[overwinter on the bare stems and burst into bloom from late February to early April before the new leaves emerge. Silvery winter flower buds and brown branching are ornamentally attractive.](#)"

Our own Geoff Leister has shared his appreciation of paperbush through propagation and photography. Take a look at this exquisite flower, visited by a honey bee. The photo on the right gives an idea of the branching and winter colors of the larger plant. And check out that happy cardinal couple.

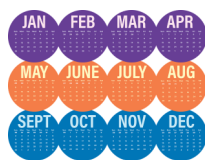

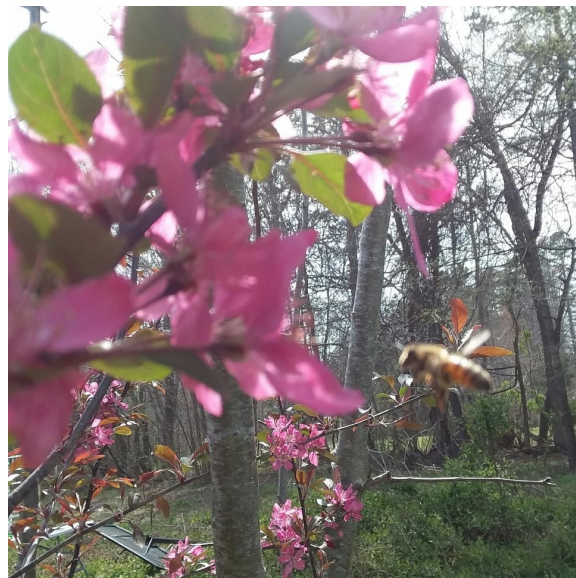
