#### Swarm Team

In 2020 the Alamance County Beekeepers created a "Swarm Team" to respond to swarm calls from the public.

When a swarm call was received, Jeff Telander sent a group text to everyone on the Swarm Team list to let them know and to find out who was available. The 1st person to respond to the text message was given the exact address/ location & contact info of the individual who called Jeff about the swarm. To make it fair for everyone, if multiple beekeepers responded to the text, preference was given to those who had not yet had a chance to respond to a swarm call.

In 2020 the Swarm Team responded to 39 swarm calls!

#### 2021 Wildflower of the Year

My climbing aster (*Ampelaster carolinianus*) still has a few open blooms, but most Aster flower heads have the characteristic winter "feathery" dried flower head (second photo). Each flower head is composed of bundles of mature seeds or achenes, as they are called botanically, with a white pappus composed of long bristles that facilitates wind dispersal much like in dandelions. And bees were activiely bringing in pollen yesterday.

### This Month in the Bee Yard

- Add pollen supplements, if needed
- Check/repair/replace stored equipment
- Keep learning---bee school, read books/ journals, etc.
- Combine or insulate smaller (less than 4 frames of bees) hives.
- Combine hives where queen has failed, if they're still alive and haven't absconded.
- Move hives if they'll need to be relocated this year.
- Bees may need help removing dead bodies from entrance area.
