Remembering Dr. John Ambrose

Notes from January's Meeting

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Ira Poston, Don Moore, and Toni Murray, with warm remembrances, acknowledged the passing of Dr. John Ambrose.

John Ambrose was a gentleman. He knew well the history of beekeeping. He could taste honey and know where it came from, where the bees foraged. He embodied both the art and the science of beekeeping.

One cannot talk about the North Carolina State Beekeepers Association without also talking about the work Dr. Ambrose did with them.

Dr. Ambrose's impact on the world of beekeeping was so wide-ranging and so profound, that even beekeepers who never knew him have acquired knowledge and practices from him.

Don Moore spoke about the European traditional practice of telling the bees on the death of their beekeeper.

Fran Shepherd declared simply, "He was an awesome man."

Mentors needed. The 2015 class of beekeepers will need mentors for this year. Please contact Ira if you would like to share your knowledge and experience with new beeks.


