From Geoff's Apiary...

I have eliminated the drowning of bees in my Miller Top feeders by the addition of one or two 5/16 diameter dowels cut to fit behind screened enclosure. If by chance the feeder runs dry, just make sure the dowels are free to float when resupplying syrup by using a length stiff wire through the screen, like coat hanger wire, to free up the dowels. Or spray water onto dowel, since that will sometimes help free up the stuck dowel.

Please see the recent Backyard Beekeeping article entitled "A Slatted Rack and Robbing Screen Can Improve Your Hive Entrance." These are extras for your Langstroth hives.

My 6 eight frame hives are now configured with a slatted racks and robbing screens.



This Month in the Bee Yard

- Attend NCSBA annual Summer Meeting, if possible (usually mid-July)---great learning opportunity!
- Get supers on for cotton honey, if hives near cotton fields.
- Replace failing queens; consider replacing any queen that is two years old or older.
- Can begin annual varroa mite assessment, and treat if needed/practical.


As a 501(c)3, we are also able to accept donations. Donations can be accepted a few different ways, feel free to reach out for more information.
