

Uniformity of appearance (between and within sections)	25
Neatness of comb cut: ragged edges, parallel cuts, uniformity & size of cuts	30
Uniformity of color	15
Absence of watery cappings	10
Appearance of cappings and freedom from impurities	
Cleanliness and general appearance of containers	10
TOTAL	100

This Month in the Bee Yard

- Beehive population drops; drones begin their seasonal die-off.
- Leave your hive with at least 60 pounds of nectar for winter use.
- May feed thin (1:1) syrup to stimulate laying. By end of month, thicken syrup to 2:1 to be used for winter stores if you haven't left enough honey.
- Combine colonies at end of month if you have weak or failing queens.
- Continue pest control activities. Varroa treatments should be finished by end of month.
- Give thanks for fall nectar and pollen!
